You will notice a significant change in the format of this week's report.

Marshall County is once again a red zone county, but this is not due to increasing cases or incidence rate. Our rates and cases continue to drop. We are once again in the red zone due to the new rating system released by the CDC and adopted by KDPH this week.

We have entered a new phase in the pandemic. Per the CDC and KDPH, counties will be ranked as:

- 1. Low Risk (Green)
- 2. Medium Risk (Yellow)
- 3. High Risk (Red)

The county level of green, yellow, or red is based on three criteria:

- 1. Weekly average incidence rate
- 2. Weekly average number of people admitted to the hospital with COVID-19
- 3. Hospital capacity devoted to caring for COVID-19 patients

Each level comes with community recommendations for mitigating further spread of the virus. The intent of the new model is focusing our efforts on minimization of the impact of COVID-19 on our health, healthcare systems, and society while protecting those who are most at risk. 
Here are the CDC recommendations for each county depending on the current level.
